Centre for Autism Spectrum Disorder

In a recent article by the HealthTimes, Director of the Centre for Autism Spectrum Disorder, Professor Vicki Bitsika shared her thoughts about Pauline Hanson's comments on autistic children in mainstream schools.

Vicki highlighted an alternate point of view that required schools to upskill their teachers and improve their knowledge base about children with autism. She also stated that these children are "intelligent, quirky, loyal, keen to do the right thing and they think outside the box. Quite frankly, our school environment would be poorer without them." Current research run in the Centre for Autism Spectrum Disorder, in collaboration with international researchers in the UK, US and Europe, explores the capabilities of autistic children rather than their problems.

John Sheehan: Order of Australia (AM)

Professor Sheehan was recently awarded the Order of Australia (AM) as part of the Queen's Birthday 2017 Honours List. He was recognised for his 'significant service to the real estate and property planning sectors, to professional institutes, and to educational and legal bodies.'

As part of the official announcement, Professor Sheehan's community service was highlighted. He has served the Australian Property Institute in a number of capacities, including the President of the Australian Property Institute (New South Wales Division) from 2001 - 2004. He has also been a member since 1967. In 1997 and 1998, Professor Sheehan was awarded the Annual Award for Excellence in Planning by the Planning Institute of Australia. In 1997, the Australian Property Institute awarded him the S F Whittington Gold Medal. In 2005, he was the recipient of the Life Fellowship from the Australian Property Institute, and in 2009 was the Fellow of the Planning Institute of Australia.

Artificial Intelligence and Creative Industries

Research Week kicked off on Monday, 16 October with Assistant Professor of Advertising and Integrated Marketing Communications Dr Sven Brodmerkel joining a panel of industry professionals and academics in a discussion about how artificial intelligence may affect creative industries. The panel pondered questions such as: Can creativity be automated? What does this mean for the future of creativity? And, how do persuasive algorithms work?

"We tend to forget how to evaluate the creative process. How do we recognise a good idea compared to one that is so-so? Scientists are actually working on giving machines these kind of evaluative functions, but we are not really there yet," explains Dr Brodmerkel.
