Sean NewcomerProfessor, Exercise Scientist, USA

Sean is Department Chair and Professor in the Department of Kinesiology at California State University San Marcos. He conducts research on the role that equipment and apparel plays on surf performance. Specifically, he is interested in the impact that wetsuit design and materials have on thermoregulation.



James Furness Assist/Professor, Physiotherapist, Australia

James is an assistant professor at Bond University and lead researcher within the Water based research unit. James has combined his passions of surfing and musculoskeletal physiotherapy together performing research on injury epidemiology and musculoskeletal assessment within the surfing community.



Kim Bruce Emergency Medicine Specialist, Australia

Kim is an emergency physician based at the Gold Coast University Hospital. His experience working in aeromedical retrieval and trauma centres across Australia have led to an ongoing interest in adult/paediatric resuscitation. He is a passionate educator in life support skills through ALS/APLS, especially at a community level. Mike Climstein Assoc/Prof, Exercise Physiologist, Australia
