The Institute for Evidence-Based Healthcare (IEBH) delivers world-class research, engagement and training that serves as a national and international resource for scholars, clinicians, system leaders, patients, and families in the implementation of evidence-based healthcare. The effective integration of research into practice contributes to the health and healthcare of Australians, influences health policy, improves global health outcomes, and enhances Bond University's reputation as Australia's leading private, independent, not-for-profit University.

IEBH Mission Statement

We aim to improve healthcare by better understanding the causes of, and solutions to, gaps between research evidence and its application in practice.

To achieve this, we:

- Undertake research that more closely aligns evidence and patient care.
- Support and extend collaborations between clinicians and health researchers to achieve higher value care.
- Enable patients and families to make evidence-informed health decisions that are congruent with their values and preferences.
- Lead and facilitate the teaching and learning of evidence-based practice.
- Develop young researchers for research programs in sustainable health care.

To deliver these aims, we will generate new research evidence on four big, neglected problems in healthcare.



<u>Antibiotic resistance</u>: which currently leads to over 30,000 avoidable deaths per year in both Europe and the USA, threatening elective surgery, and a resurgence of the bacterial diseases of the 19th century.



Overdiagnosis: which has led to massive increase in the apparent prevalence of many diseases through definition change and overdetection, causing harm and rising healthcare costs.



<u>Neglected non-pharmaceutical treatments</u>: which are often as effective and as safe, or safer than their pharmaceutical cousins, but are poorly described, poorly "marketed", and therefore, little used.



<u>Waste in Medical Research</u>: is estimated to cost > \$100 billion per year from avoidable design flaws, non-publication and poor reporting, resulting in >85% avoidable waste.

IEBH Directors Report for 2022


The impact of the Institute's research has been steadily increasing in part enabled by the contract research being done for organisations such as WHO (report on COVID19 platform trials), the National Heart Foundation (CVD absolute risk), the Department of Health (MBS health assessment items review), and the NSW Agency for Clinical Innovation (methods to prioritize and implement work on evidence practice gaps). Other notable impacts are the support for Gold Coast Health with Journal Clubs during the pandemic with strong endorsement from Queensland Chief Medical Officer, John Gerard, and the growing usage of the Systematic Review Accelerator tools.

The two-week systematic reviews have developed extremely well, and now has it's own webpage: <u>https://iebh.bond.edu.au/education-services/2-week-systematic-reviews-2weeksr</u> We have now completed almost twenty "2 week" reviews with new types and greater complexity. Several groups have expressed interest in learning or using, e.g., NSW ACI, SA Hospital Research Foundation, GCUH, and the methods have been successfully transferred to Griffith's NHMRC Centre for Research Excellence (in wound management).

Finally, we recently published the results of a factorial randomised controlled trial involving audit & feedback letters to 3,819 high-requesting GPs. The reduction in imaging represents an estimated 36,158 fewer diagnostic imaging tests at 12 months (\$3-4Million saving), O'Connor DA, Glasziou P, Maher C, Albarqouni L, et al.
