OUR MISSION

We aim to improve healthcare by better understanding the causes of, and solutions to, gaps between research evidence and its application in practice.

KEY GOALS

To achieve this we:

- Undertake research that more closely aligns evidence and patient care.
- Support and extend collaborations between clinicians and health researchers to achieve higher value care.
- Enable patients and families to make evidenceinformed health decisions that are congruent with their values and preferences.
- Lead and facilitate the teaching and learning of evidence-based practice.
- Develop young researchers for research programs in sustainable healthcare.

To deliver these aims, we generate new research evidence on big, neglected problems in healthcare.

Director's Report

The focus for 2023 was the transition of IEBH beyond Prof Paul Glasziou's retirement at the end of 2024.

NEW DIRECTOR

This year we re-advertised the Director role using a recruitment consultant and commenced a search for the Director (having not appointed a Deputy Director last year). We are delighted that Professor Julie Redfern, from Sydney University has accepted the offer as Director, starting 27 May 2024.

Julie is a Professor of Public Health, a current holder of a NHMRC Investigator Grant L2 (NHMRC Elizabeth Blackburn Award for Health Services), a practicing Physiotherapist, leads the Engagement and Co-Design Research (ECHO) team in the School of Health Sciences, Faculty of Medicine and Health, and is a Professorial Fellow at the George Institute for Global Health. Her research interests include: cardiovascular and chronic disease prevention and management; implementation science and translational research; clinical trials; development, testing and implementation of mobile/digital health interventions, and consumer engagement and codesign.

With the delayed start in the Director role, we have used the initial funding for 3 part-time roles:

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1. An experienced academic researcher with good knowledge/connection with funders. To assist with opportunities for other funding, such as with Queensland Government, Professor Michael Kimlin, who has good connections and skills with QLD Health and the other major funders (NHMRC and MRFF) has been undertaking this role on a part-time basis, but will hopefully continue in a 3-year role.

2. Temporary Director of the Evidence-Based Practice Professorial Unit (EBPPU) at the Gold Coast University Hospital

With Professor Henry's retirement at the end of 2022, Prof Glasziou is filling his role, and will continue at least until 2024. The EBPPU is vital to Bond's relationship with the Gold Coast Health surface, and to the long-term funds for IEBH.

3. Business development - for implementing the commercialisation plan of the Systematic Review Accelerator tools

In 2022, Chatsworth Associates (led by Andrew Maxwell) completed a commercialisation plan for our SRA tools. Their clear and high quality advice suggested we repackage the "search tools" and then market these for the larger organisations undertaking systematic reviews. IEBH have been working on repackaging the software, and also aim to hire someone with the necessary marketing and commercial skills. This work continued during 2023.

GRANT SUBMISSIONS

We have submitted several major grants this year (each \$2Million+) - one NHMRC CRE, two MRFF grants, and two investigator grants. Though it scored well, the CRE was not funded, but we resubmitted in November 2023.



STAFFING CHANGES FOR 2023

- 1. Professor Michael Kimlin has joined IEBH on a 12-month contract, 2 days per week, to help with grants, mentoring and external opportunities.
- Assistant Professor Sharon Sanders is working 2 days at the EBP Professorial Unit at the Gold Coast Hospital, and run several well-attended workshops for infectious diseases and the Allied Health departments.
- 3. Mina Bakhit a Post-doc on the CREMARC CRE on antibiotic stewardship, is working 0.8 with HSM as lead for public health teaching, and may continue longer term.
- HSM will be advertising a Business Manager position. IEBH will contribute 1 day per week for 12 months to get assistance on the SRA commercialisation and External Engagement.
- 5. Kazi Rahman an infectious disease epidemiologist has started with the MHI team and is working with CREMARC and others.

The long term aim is to have increased HSM posts affiliated with IEBH, and to increase non-grant funds, especially from commercialisation for the SRA tools.

TELEHEALTH IMPACT

The uptake of telehealth by Australians has been considerable, representing 17.2% of all consultations in 2022. By provider, in 2022. telehealth consultations represented: 21.9 of all GP consultations, 13.7% of specialist consultations, 27.1% of mental health consultations, 28.3% of nurse practitioner consultations and 14.5% of allied health consultations. In October 2020, IEBH was contracted by the then-Department of Health (now known as the Commonwealth Department of Health and Aged Care), to complete a review of the evidence for the effectiveness, safety and economic impacts of the provision of primary and allied healthcare via telehealth. The Institute completed the review in February 2021 and since then, over two years of additional evidence on the effectiveness and safety of telehealth has been published. In 2023, the team completed 2 new reports which is now available on the government's

ANTIBIOTIC RESISTANCE

which currently leads to over 30,000 avoidable deaths per year in both Europe and the USA, threatening elective surgery, and a resurgence of the bacterial diseases of the 19th century.



NEGLECTED NON-PHARMACEUTICAL TREATMENTS

Neglected non-pharmaceutical treatments: which are often as effective and as safe, or safer than their pharmaceutical cousins, but are poorly described, poorly "marketed", and therefore, little used.



OVERDIAGNOSIS

Overdiagnosis: which has led to massive increase in the apparent prevalence of many diseases through definition change and overdetection, causing harm and rising healthcare costs.



WASTE IN MEDICAL RESEARCH

Waste in Medical Research: is estimated to cost > \$100 billion per year from avoidable design flaws, non-publication and poor reporting, resulting in >85% avoidable waste challenges. Workshops

During 2023 the Institute hosted a number of face-to-face as well as online workshops on topics such as evidence-based practice, the 2weekSR process, and the use of automation tools to improve the speed of conducting, create efficient search strategies and improve the efficiency of screening studies for systematic reviews.

EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICE

The Evidence-Based Practice Professorial Unit (EBPPU) at the Gold Coast Hospital hosted 9 face-to-face workshops on Evidence-Based Practice for >100 Gold Coast Hospital and Health Services Staff. The departments include:

- Mental Health
- · Infectious Diseases
- · Allied Health.

SYSTEMATIC REVIEW ACCELERATOR (SRA) TOOLS

In 2023, a total of 33 online workshops were conducted, focusing on the utilisation of the automation tools (SRA) to enhance the efficiency of various tasks, such as:

- 1. improving the speed of conducting;
- 2. creating efficient search strategies; and
- 3. improving the efficiency of screening studies for systematic reviews were presented.

These workshops attracted significant attention, drawing over 400 participants from various corners of the globe, including Australia, Italy, Germany, the UK, Argentina, Switzerland, the US, and Canada.

2WEEKSR

In June, Assistant Professor Anna Scott presented a two-day face-to-face workshop on the 2weekSR process at the Australian Institute of Health Innovation (AIHI), Macquarie University.

A 2 week systematic review (2weekSR) is a full systematic review (SR) done to a high methodological standard following all the normal systematic review processes, completed in a vastly shortened time frame. This workshop provided guidance on how to complete a SR in approximately two work weeks, covering the planning required, team needed, processes involved, and the Systematic Review Automation (SRA) tools used.

FULL DAY FACE-TO FACE OXFORD

During September a full-day workshop teaching research skills was held at the University of Oxford. The workshop was presented by Justin Clark, Research Enhancement Manager at IEBH. It taught researchers from academic institutions from across the UK, how to use the Systematic Review Accelerator (SRA). The SRA is a suite of research tools built at IEBH that can substantially reduce the time taken to conduct an evidence synthesis. The workshop was an excellent way to showcase Bond's research to other institutions around the world.

WISER HEALTHCARE

On 16-17 October 2023, the Institute hosted the annual National Wiser Healthcare meeting at Bond University. Over 40 researchers, early career researchers, and PhD students attended with >25 presentations across the 2 days. The next meeting will be held in Sydney in 2024.

WORLD EBHC DAY

Ambassador for the 2023 World EBHC Day which is held 20 October each year. The 2023 campaign focused on Evidence and Global Health Equity.

WONCA

The 2023 WONCA World Conference was held in Sydney from 26-29 October 2023. A total of 4434 delegates walked the halls of Sydney's International Convention Centre with more than 850 presentations, seven keynote addresses, and 58 topic areas covered. Australian doctors were especially well represented at the 50th anniversary of the famous conference with 2857 attendees.

- Dr Oyuka Byambasuren: 1) Impact of COVID-19 vaccination on long COVID: a systematic review; and 2) Lived experience of long COVID patients and perspectives of general practitioners in Australia: qualitative studies.
- Dr Michelle Guppy: Panel discussion on the management of chronic kidney disease and the use of ageing kidney charts as a management tool.



GOLDNET RESEARCH NETWORK

In 2023, the GoldNet Research Network focused on "closing the research loop" and selected topics and speakers that align this for various events (1 online journal club, 2 face-to-face networking events).

REPORTING GUIDELINES WEBINAR

In September the Australasian EQUATOR Centre in collaboration with AUS-RN presented a webinar on how to: 1) write the key sections of a research article efficiently and effectively; 2) using reporting guidelines such as PRISMA, CONSORT, and STROBE to guide the writing task, assist publication and improve the impact of your research; and 3) respond to and provide constructive peer review.

SYSTEMATIC REVIEW ACCELERATOR

It has been another successful year for the SRA. There have been 25,000 users and over 200,000 interactions (event counts) with the SRA in the last six months. Solid progress has been made with the upgrade to the new, improved, version of the SRA, which will have a beta launch early in 2024. Workshops have been very successful with large numbers of attendees, with a new and improved suite of workshops planned for next year. In exciting news, there are ongoing collaborations with multiple organisations to increase the usability and applicability of the SRA. These collaborations are with the Institute for Quality and Efficiency in Health Care in Germany, the University of Leicester in the UK, and the University of Queensland. These collaborations will improve SRA support for Health Technology Assessments, provide high-quality meta-analysis software, and potentially incorporate large language models (AI) into the SRA.
