By studying Psychology at Bond, students will be professionally qualified from a bachelor's level up to and including a doctoral level.



**Graduates will independently source and undertake an additional one year of supervised practice to become eligible to apply for full registration as a Psychologist, and full membership of the Australian Psychology Society (APS).

REGISTRATION

Upon successful completion of this pathway, graduates will be eligible to apply for full registration with Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA). Graduates will also be eligible to apply for membership to the Australian Psychological Society (APS). Clinical master's graduates will be eligible for associate membership of the APS College of Clinical Psychologists.

CAREER OUTCOMES

Psychology is an applied discipline that underpins many occupations and vocational areas. Master's graduates can obtain employment in applied areas such as clinical, forensic, sports and organisational psychology. Students who exit after their undergraduate degree are able to pursue careers in human resource functions such as training and development, recruitment and selection, in advertising and marketing, or in areas such as counselling or research.

The Bachelor of Psychological Science will provide you with a scientific understanding of normal psychological processes such as perception, memory, learning, motivation, biology, personality, emotion, developmental psychology, and social relationships, as well as training in statistical analysis.

Professional outcomes

An undergraduate qualification in psychology can lead to employment opportunities in counselling, as well as in professional areas such as advertising and marketing, research positions, and human resources roles related to recruitment, selection, training and development. Graduates of a Bachelor of Psychological Science are also eligible to apply for Fourth Year programs of study in Psychology.

Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Bridging)

Program description

The Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Bridging) allows students to fast-track a qualification equivalent to a three-year undergraduate sequence in the discipline of psychology. It is designed for students who have completed an undergraduate program in a discipline other than psychology and are looking to transition to the pathway required for registration (non-cognate), or for students who have completed an undergraduate psychology qualification but have not met the entry threshold to progress to fourth year (cognate). This program is not available to international students who intend to apply for a student visa to undertake this program.

Entry requirements

Successful completion of a Bachelor program in a discipline other than Psychology (non-cognate), or completion of an undergraduate Psychology (cognate) qualification but having not met the entry threshold to progress to Fourth Year.

Professional outcomes

The Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Bridging) meets the equivalent of a three-year undergraduate sequence in Psychology, as required by APAC as the first step to becoming registered as a practicing Psychologist.

Program description

Bond's Fourth Year Psychology programs are designed to provide students with an integrated, comprehensive, and complete education in the discipline of psychology. Students undertake advanced training in a range of methodological and applied areas and develop competence in conducting research. All content is based on the scientist-practitioner model, and evidence-based approaches to psychological intervention are stressed.

Entry requirements

Admission to a Fourth Year program of study in Psychology requires the successful completion of an accredited threeyear sequence of study in psychology in Australia, or equivalent.

Applicants for the Bachelor of Psychological Science with Honours must have achieved a minimum GPA of 2.5 on the Bond University 4-point scale (or CGPA of 70 per cent) for all second and third level psychology subjects in their undergraduate studies.

Applicants for the Graduate Diploma of Psychological Science must have achieved a minimum GPA of 2.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale (or CGPA of 65 per cent-69 per cent) for all second and third level psychology subjects in their undergraduate studies.

Professional outcomes

Graduates meet the eligibility to apply for provisional registration as a Psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia. Full registration requires an additional two years study in an accredited master's program.

Program description

The Master of Professional Psychology program provides advanced education in the professional practice of psychology. The training is based on a scientist-practitioner model and is designed to prepare students with the knowledge and applied skills required by a registered practicing psychologist. The program draws from a range of theoretical perspectives informed by contemporary research and practice. This degree integrates coursework, and practical placement experience.

Students complete 300 hours of practicum. This supervised professional experience will occur partly through clinical activities in the Bond University Psychology Clinic under staff supervision.

Entry requirements

Entry to the Master of Professional Psychology requires the successful completion of an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited four year sequence of study in Psychology (e.g. Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours); Graduate Diploma of Psychological Science or equivalent) within the last 10 years, with a minimum lower second class Honours (H2B), or equivalent (2.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale or CGPA of 65 per cent to 74 per cent). Applicants are assessed on academic merit, referee reports, and personal suitability via interview and psychometric testing. Candidates must also be eligible for provisional registration as a Psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia.

Professional outcomes

The program meets the requirements for registration as set out by the Psychology Board of Australia. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates will independently source and undertake an additional one year of supervised practice to become eligible to apply for full registration as a Psychologist, and full membership of the Australian Psychology Society (APS).

The Master of Psychology (Clinical) program provides advanced education in the professional practice of psychology. The training is based on a scientist-practitioner model and is designed to prepare students with the knowledge and applied skills required by a registered practising psychologist. The program draws from a range of theoretical perspectives informed by contemporary research and practice. This degree integrates coursework and practical placement experience.

Program structure

Students complete a two-semester internship in the Bond University Psychology Clinic under staff supervision and two externships in community settings under external supervision.

*Please note: Students may be required to travel outside of the Gold Coast region to undertake external placements. Bond University cannot guarantee the timing of external placement. Students may need to extend beyond six semesters in order to complete all the necessary components of the program. Students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to and from externship locations.

Entry requirements

Entry to the Master of Psychology (Clinical) requires the successful completion of an Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) accredited four year sequence of study in Psychology (e.g. Bachelor of Psychological Science (Honours); Graduate Diploma of Psychological Science or equivalent) within the last 10 years, with a minimum upper second class Honours (H2A), or equivalent (3.0 on the Bond University 4-point scale or CGPA of 75 per cent or above). Applicants are assessed on academic merit, referee reports, and personal suitability via interview and psychometric testing. Candidates must also be eligible for provisional registration as a Psychologist with the Psychology Board of Australia.

Applications are also accepted into the Master of Psychology (Clinical) program at Bond University from board registered Psychologists who have successfully completed the Master of Professional Psychology program, or a Level 3 accredited APAC psychology program with a Distinction GPA level (75 per cent or above). Applicants will submit the same documents as outlined above.

Professional outcomes

The program meets the requirements for registration as set out by the Psychology Board of Australia. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates are eligible to apply for full registration as a Psychologist, a Board approved Registrar Program (for area of practice endorsement), full membership of the Australian Psychology Society (APS), and associate membership of the corresponding APS Specialist College.

Higher Degree Research (HDR)

Entry requirements

The minimum requirement for PhD candidature is a four year psychology degree with a GPA of upper second class (H2A) or equivalent (75 per cent or above). Alternatively, candidates may have a research master's degree or qualifications deemed to be equivalent to the above by the HDR Committee. Where applicable, students may be asked to commence in a Master of Philosophy as a pathway into the full PhD candidature.



Student community

Bond Psychological Society (BPS)

The Bond Psychological Society (BPS) aims to create a community that offers students a sense of belonging and support during their studies in Psychology at Bond. The BPS also endeavours to provide networking opportunities for both undergraduate and postgraduate students with local industry professionals and, in conjunction with the Australian Psychological Society, opportunities for professional development and personal growth.



Facilities

Test Library

The Test Library has an extensive collection of psychological test materials that support the teaching, research and clinical activities of the School's students and staff.

Dedicated learning spaces

Undergraduate students can participate in studies conducted by our fourth year and PhD students in our Cognitive Research Labs. At fourth year and master's level, students have access to a designated and secured study space available to analyse data and write up their research findings.



Accreditation

All Psychology programs of study at Bond University specified in this document are accredited with the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and approved by the Psychology Board of Australia (PsyBA).

Accreditation is renewed every five years. Psychology majors undertaken within degrees not specified within this document are not APAC accredited and as such do not form part of the accredited sequence of study required to become a registered Psychologist.


The Bond University Psychology Clinic

The Bond University Psychology Clinic is a student training facility, which has been providing psychological services to the Gold Coast community since 1999.

These services are provided by provisionally registered Master of Psychology students, under the guidance of qualified supervisors and cover an extensive range of assessments and interventions for psychological and healthrelated concerns. The Bond University Psychology Clinic is an invaluable asset for postgraduate students, and presents them with an opportunity to work with clients of all ages.

Members of the public are welcome to contact the BUPC for cognitive and clinical assessments and psychological treatment for individuals, families, children, and adolescents for issues including anxiety, low moods, stress, grief, depression, adjustment disorder and family and relationship issues. Interns work with clients from the community under the supervision of highly experienced and qualified clinical supervisors and academic staff. Supervision and training during the Internship utilise a hypothesis testing approach to introduce Interns to the practice of evidence-based therapy, in accordance with the tradition of the scientistpractitioner model.

Within this structured and supportive environment, Interns cultivate their counselling skills; which are important in the development and maintenance of a therapeutic alliance; interview skills to gather critical information to conduct intake, initial interviews, and formal psychological assessments; the ability to plan, design, provide and evaluate psychological treatment; and knowledge of ethical, legal, and professional practice matters.

"Life isn't like a textbook and applying knowledge to real-life clients in the Master of Psychology (Clinical) was a big step up from applying it to case studies in assignments or exams in my undergraduate and fourth year studies. Whether we were discussing new learnings and resources, spending countless hours together writing reports, or just heading to the café for a snack and a debrief, the supportive team environment at Bond made all the difference. It has helped me build a network of emerging psychology professionals, which I know will assist me as I move forward with my career.

My internship and externship placements through the Bond University Psychology Clinic encapsulated four subjects of my overall master's program and gave me the opportunity to work face-to-face with clients for sixteen incredibly rewarding months. We also had regular opportunities to connect with supervisors and discuss our strengths and weaknesses. There were so many opportunities to learn, and the experience taught me key skills that I will carry throughout my career and into my daily life. Sitting down with my supervisor to determine where I could improve was honestly where I saw the greatest gains in my clinical skills and is a huge part of what I took away from the internship experience.

My time at the clinic showed me that everything, and everyone, can be treated as another way to grow, evolve our thinking, and take away valuable lessons. If you're studying psychology with the intention to be a registered practitioner, or are considering it, the placement experience along with the coursework knowledge taught in the Master of Psychology (Clinical) is invaluable."
